UCM Midyear Reports from Committees and Ministry Areas

Executive Team

Issues the ET has worked on since summer:

- balancing workload efficiently with staff members as part of a larger Management Team;
- balancing responsibilities and enhancing communication between ET and Board;
- collaborating with the choir to determine the best tangible way to recognize Catherine Orr's long music ministry;
- meeting with Community Lunch reps to establish management procedures and provide support for this new UCM ministry;
- reviewing recommended changes to personnel and safe congregation policies;
- developing parameters for the Personnel Ctee to use in creating hiring guidelines;
- filling leadership positions;
- helping the Committee of Chairs get their current-year programs started;
- working with the Social Responsibility Ctee and Board to approve UCM becoming a member of Vermont Interfaith Power & Light;
- monitoring completion of the major accessibility and capital projects undertaken this summer and fall;
- exploring with the Board the feasibility of creating a Legacy Research Task Force;
- setting our priorities for the year and developing a monitoring schedule.

ET priorities include developing fruitful working relationships with/among our new Minister and the whole Management Team; providing direct support to the Community Lunch, Communications, Finance, Leadership Development, Living Lighter, and Social Responsibility Committees. We are also very interested in the work of the Board's 2020 Vision Task Force.

Accessibility Committee

Chair vacant; report based on notes from committee's last visit to the ET.

The past six months have seen major improvements to accessibility of our church building: replacement of doorknobs with levers; construction of a fully ADA-compliant accessible bathroom, with associated changes to storage space in the vestry; six new stair railings; improvements to the School Street entrance; and re-striping of the parking lot to include one accessible space. Signage and storage space remain to be completed. Work continues on raising awareness of hidden and invisible disabilities. Further physical improvements will be discussed as part of the 2020 Vision effort.

NOTE: The ET thanks and commends Sam Clark for these remarkable successes in the year he served as Chair of the Accessibility Committee.

Administration Committee

The Administration Committee meets this year irregularly on an "as needed" basis. We have a established a focus team format centering our work around technology, communications, finances and office services. Each member of our committee heads a specific team: Ron Marion, Communications, Jason Boyd, Technology, John Poeton, Finances and Norma Raymond, office services. Anyone interested in assisting with our team work is encouraged to contact the team leader.

During our Committee meeting, usually held for one hour from 11:30 until 12:30 on the third Friday of the month, we receive updates from the Church Administrator and the Office Assistant. Our major focus this year has been on ways to improve the telephone system within the church and also ways that we can improve the wi-fi network throughout the building. We are presently investigating two possible ways that the connection of electronic devices can be established on a regular basis in every room at UCM. The committee hopes that this plan can be implemented before the end of this church year.

Adult Religious Education Committee

The Adult Religious Education Committee formed this year to try to provide more energy and structure to the effort of creating RE opportunities for adults. Some members of the committee had been involved in the broader Religious Education committee in the past. The current committee members are still determining whether this should be a separate committee or a subcommittee of the RE Committee. The group has organized several programs since its inception. Fall 2015 Paul Ohlson co-facilitated the first half of "The Wi\$dom Path," a series devoted to exploring the connection between spirituality and money. Kristin Glaser offered the first half of "Principled Commitments," a series that explores relationships and spirituality for partnered people. Decisions are forthcoming as to whether both of those series will continue into the Spring. The committee is also discussing other programming for Winter and Spring. Those possible programs include the January spiritual retreat, a book discussion group for one of Kate Braestrup's works, a book discussion of either *Just Mercy* (the UU common read) or another text about racial justice or religious fundamentalism, and a version of OWL designed for older adults. We continue to research options like the Tapestry of Faith programs and increasing multigenerational learning opportunities that address issues across the lifespan.

Community Lunch Committee

The Community Lunch is now an official program of UCM. The Women's Alliance gave us money to get started, we found out how to find good, healthy free food, and volunteers signed up to start serving meals to 32 guests on the first Monday in July. UCM has added electric outlets in the basement for additional cold food storage, and hired Dan Wetmore to build a beautiful rodent-proof, locked food pantry. The Hunger Mountain Food Co-op awarded us a grant to buy a freezer. We became a VT Foodbank Network Partner, and we studied and trained volunteers in safe food handling procedures. The Social Responsibility Committee very generously awarded us the Community Pouch proceeds for November, and we have received many other donations in kind and cash. We now have about 45 regular volunteers, about 15 of whom work on any given Monday, serving guests now numbering 80 to over 100 each Monday. Paula Gills and other musicians share their talents. We have sensational chefs in Scott Hess, John Poeton, Ron Marion and Priscilla Fox. The lunches have become a social event, and we are told that the word on the street is that the UCM CL is a favorite in town. Please join us between 11:00 and 12:30 any Monday, including holidays. And we welcome more volunteers. We start at 8, and finish around 2. Many activities only take an hour and a half, and range from set-up to food prep to serving to clean up. Finance Committee

Our Mission Statement: The Finance Committee assists the Executive Team and Board in overseeing the financial health of the Church, prepares the annual budget for review by the ET and Board, monitors the approved annual budget, oversees the long term invested funds, and ensures that the church is properly insured.

The Committee has had two meetings so far this year. We were pleased that the 2014-15 church year ended in the black, despite the reduction in anticipated income due to changes in the format of the auction.

A new counting procedure was instituted with the beginning of the church year based on the recommendation of staff and chair of the Administration Committee. The system is designed to

make the process shorter and less complicated for the Sunday pouch counters. A training session for counters was held at the beginning of the year.

In October, the Church received the second and final installment of the Jackman bequest which was deposited in the Long Term Invested Funds. In November the Committee met with Rich Pearce from our LTIF manager, The Trust Company of Vermont. Rich had prepared a summary and report of our investments which was discussed and reviewed by the attendees at the meeting.

Living Lighter Committee

The Living Lighter Committee has continued to monitor recycling efforts in the church building. Our efforts in the area of Environmental Justice have been disappointing as to our relationship with the Food As Medicine folks who are trying to establish a garden space at two low-income housing sites in Barre. Because of the transient nature of the tenants, it is difficult to get continuity in the garden effort. Working under the theme of food insecurity, we have done volunteer work with the Vermont Youth Conservation Corps which prepares boxes of food for 300 individuals/families who have been identified as food-challenged.

Some of our members have taken active volunteer roles in the new UCM Community Lunch program which also addresses the subject of food insecurity. The LLC effort is two-pronged with the first important area being to provide food for people who may not have access to nutritious food because of lack of income. The efforts mentioned above attack that problem. The second area is to attempt to influence the decisions people of limited means make when they purchase food. This is a side of the Community Lunch we have not begun to address but hope we can start to work on. We have had representatives come in and sign up people for Three Squares, the program that replaced food stamps. This is a step in the right direction, and we hope to be able to educate our guests on ways to improve their food choices in ways that save their precious financial resources.

Looking ahead, the members met to suggest ways in which the Committee could be more active in a variety of energy areas. It was decided that members should attend the Visioning events to make their individual interests known. When the report comes out, the Committee will evaluate what is included that would be appropriate for us to work on.

The chair of the LLC has given notice that, upon the publication of the Visioning project, he will step down and allow for new leadership.

Property Committee

Property Mission: Protect and maintain the church in keeping with historical integrity and current needs.

These past six months have seen the following projects completed or nearing completion:

- 1. Two unsound steel fuel tanks (cellar) have been removed and replaced with one larger fiberglass tank.
- 2. Safety-code-approved handrails have been added in six locations in the Vestry and Bell Tower room.
- 3. The Children's Chapel and room have been cleaned and painted.
- 4. A six-unit bike rack (Special Gift) has been fabricated and installed.
- 5. The accessible bathroom is complete and in service.
- 6. The accessible power door is installed and operational.
- 7. The church cellar has been thoroughly cleaned and trash removed and/or given away.
- 8. Brighter, cheaper lighting (LED technology) has been added to the Nursery, Children's Chapel, Administrator's office, and DRE's office.
- 9. Shelving and lighting has been added behind the organ and bell tower room for additional storage.
- 10. Lowered thresholds (added safety and accessibility) in School Street foyer.
- 11. Miscellaneous painting and sprucing up the School Street Foyer.
- 12. Insulation has been added above the addition where needed (phase 1 of 2).
- 13. Kitchen stove has been reconditioned by church volunteers to function satisfactorily.
- 14. A secure dry foods closet has been constructed in the cellar for UCM's Community Lunch program.
- 15. A whole-church energy audit has been conducted under the auspices of Efficiency Vermont.

Upcoming projects to be completed in the next six months include:

- 1. Boxing in the organ bellows fan motor in the cellar for safety reasons.
- 2. Stripping and refinishing the kitchen tile floor.
- 3. Installing new coat racks in the Vestry to compensate for the loss of storage due to the new bathroom.
- 4. Construction and installation of a new picket fence on the river wall (Special Gift).
- 5. Stripping and refinishing Vestry and Fireplace Room hardwood floors.
- 6. Installing energy-efficient heat pump water heater or on-demand heaters for domestic water.
- 7. Fabricating and installing new interior signage to meet ADA requirements.
- 8. Building cellar pad and mounting large freezer for Community Lunch program.
- 9. Lowering threshold in main foyer (added safety and accessibility).

<u>Note:</u> All projects to date are on budget or slightly below budget with the notable exception of the insulation work. Insulating over the organ and over the 1982 addition has been broken into two phases with half being done this year (Special Gift) and half next year.

Montpelier Fire Department was on site for this drill. Went very well. The only change would be that the congregation should gather away from the church building beyond the north lawn rather than on the sidewalk on Main Street in front of sanctuary entrance.

Discussion of the actual sanctuary presently being closed all days (except Sunday). Did small survey of few other active churches on their policies. Bethany and St. Augustine's are open all day and evening everyday. Christ Church (under normal conditions) has fairly open door policy. When no one is in office, church is locked up. Occasional thievery, but very rarely.

Held a seminar on Sept. 20th for staff and church leaders on basic information on possible disruptive situations arising within the church. 15 people attended.

Dave met with the signage work group to establish signs around the church for the safety of the congregation.

Our Mission Statement: To provide an opportunity for spiritual reflection, building community and relationships, and service to the church and wider community to all who wish to participate. Activities: This Fall Rev. Joan Javier-Duval joined our coordinating team. She has provided wise leadership and support for Facilitators and Coordinators at monthly meetings. The Coordinating Team, including the minister, create Session Plans for each Small Group gathering. Groups meet twice a month in four-month semesters. A second semester will begin in mid-February and meet through mid-June, allowing for additional members and friends to participate.

Members enjoy getting to know each other in a confidential and facilitated time together. These groups provide time and space for reflection on our spiritual lives, and a place to share what we have discovered. Members of each group also agree to provide service to the church and community in a variety of ways. Past groups have helped weed and clean out the church gardens; packed food for the Vermont Foodbank; cleaned up after church-wide events; and provided lunch for various smaller church gatherings.

SGM Groups provide a way to get to know one another more deeply, to form bonds of friendship and caring which weave through-out the church, building a vibrant and connected community.

2015-16 UCM VIA Committee meetings. Three meetings were held, one in August, October and November. The August meeting featured summarizing decisions made in our last church year. Our UCM VIA issue would continue to be Divestment of Fossil Fuels and we would partner with 350VT in that regard. Our UCM VIA would continue to support the state-wide Clergy Caucus' campaign "Building Vermont's Moral Economy" and Central Vermont's issues on housing and homelessness. Our October meeting focused on discussing and selecting specific proposals to work on and in November we further spelled out and confirmed, delayed, or rejected some general proposals brought up in October. The big decision in November was for our UCM VIA to play the role of citizen lobbyist in the Vermont State Legislature and a smaller decision was to encourage the City of Montpelier to divest from fossil fuels when they invest the Senior Center's Jackman bequest. Details about the Bell Ringing Vigil 11/28 were provided. Sue Riggen and Harris Webster played major roles in carrying out this event where about 50 people gathered to hear bells, hear thoughts, and be silent. All meetings included training from Melissa Battah, our VIA Community Organizer, and helpful comments from our Minister, Rev. Joan Javier-Duval. Many individual members of our committee participated in various events throughout the past year planned by our partners, 350VT's state and local groups, Vermont Interfaith Power and Light, the state-wide VIA Clergy Caucus, and the Central Vermont VIA. These included at least three events held at UCM.

Welcoming Congregation Committee

The Welcoming Congregation Committee exists to guide UCM to become ever more welcoming to individuals who self-identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, queer, and questioning. We explore ways in which all those connected to the church (minister, staff, church members and friends), as well as all policies and programs, can become friendlier to the LGBTQ community.

On the first Sunday of the church year, our committee mobilized a group of UCMers to march in the Burlington Pride parade. Eighteen, including Rev. Joan, made the trip to Burlington to walk behind the UCM banner. Most wore "Standing on the Side of Love" t-shirts. We waved a number of rainbow flags, too. One of the best things about this outing was that our group ranged in age from teenagers to octogenarians.

In October, our committee helped to publicize a Coming Out Day dance that was organized by Rainbow Umbrella of Central Vermont (RUCVT). RUCVT is an LGBT adult group, which was launched in mid-March.

In recent weeks, we've been putting together a brochure that explains the work of our committee to the congregation as well as to the larger community. We've been through several drafts and hope to complete the piece by the end of the calendar year. Rev. Joan attended our November meeting and provided helpful feedback on the draft brochure.

For the third consecutive year, the committee is partnering with the Kellogg-Hubbard Library to organize a series of discussions about LGBT books and films. In September, we showed a documentary entitled "Growing Up Trans" about the challenges faced by transgender children and their families. In November, we showed a documentary entitled "Gen Silent" about LGBT seniors who are going back into the closet out of fear that they'll be discriminated against, bullied, or abused in assisted-living facilities and nursing homes.

Members of the Welcoming Congregation Committee worked with Rainbow Umbrella of Central Vermont to organize a march to draw attention to International Transgender Day of Remembrance on November 20. The march attracted over 50 participants who carried signs and walked around the intersection of State and Main Streets in Montpelier during lunch hour. The fall rummage sale was very successful, and the "Community Lunches" are now being helped by contributions from Alliance as well as other sources. Both programs were open to others in the congregation. Board members were invited to our pot luck dinners. We welcome all the women who have just begun attending our meetings.

We are putting together a lay-led service on December 27 featuring a few voices of church members and singing -- among other things. The annual "To Say their Names" service will be on January 3rd, led by Rev. Joan and Dave Grundy with the Hospice Choir participating.

We began the year by streamlining the beginning of the service, focusing announcements for our community and greetings prior to the prelude. We did this in order to keep the focus of the remainder of the service on more effectively nurturing each other's spiritual journey. In cooperation with Rev. Joan, we implemented our new Worship Associates program which involves each of the members of W&A participating in each service. We have received a lot of positive feedback about this program, as well as some constructive critique for those of us less experienced with speaking from the pulpit. We hope to hone our skills through some training sessions and more experience.

Rev. Joan also invited all of us to participate in a service planning session with worship staff. We brainstormed and discussed the monthly themes in more depth. These discussions were designed to bring ideas together for readings, music, and other inspirations for use in upcoming services. More such sessions are being scheduled through the year.

Here is a listing of our activities and accomplishments in the start of this new church year:

- -Dave Peters continues to submit "Did You Know?" factoids about our church history to the weekly announcements.
- -Dave also spearheaded the production of a single panel "Welcome to the UCM" flyer incorporating a basic timeline of our church history. It is available at the Hospitality Table and for general use. Our committee paid for the printing of the flyer.
- -On September 25 we hosted a potluck supper followed by an enlightening talk about the early life of the Reverend J. Edward Wright by Rebecca Noel of Plymouth State College in NH. Her mother, Joanna Meyer, is an active UCM member. About 40 people attended the program.
 - -We created a new display board about how our church focuses on food!
 - -We participated in the all church Committee Fair on October 25.
- -Norma Raymond, Ted Schultheis and Maggie Rebmann have arranged to do several oral histories of church members. They have experimented with about four to date. They hope to share these in some manner in the future.
- -Barbara Thompson, Peter Thoms and Ted Schultheis continue to discuss the prospects for a commemorative history project. The constraints lie in the time required to do a fine job.
- -The old church sign from the time of the Reverend Gerald FitzPatrick was restored by a professional painter to the best degree possible. Our committee personally committed \$1100 to this work! Paul Ohlson, Property Cttee. Chair, worked with Dan Wetmore to put up the sign in the stairwell near other historic signs. Barbara Thompson wrote a descriptive caption for the sign and had it mounted for display. Malcolm FitzPatrick contributed a frame for a fine photo of his father which is part of the exhibit. This meets our goal of contributing an historic artifact to the UCM community.
- -We will focus between now and the end of January on three church events to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the building of our handsome edifice. On January 24, 2016, we will work with the Worship and Arts cttee. to hold a "building rededication" service and reception. On January 30, we will host a potluck dinner and a Vermont Humanities Council program of Vermont songs of the Civil War era performed by Linda Radtke and Arthur Zorn.
